On October 24, 2022, there will be a municipal and school board trustee elections in Ontario. If you are a resident, owner or tenant of property in Ontario, a Canadian citizen and 18 years of age you can vote in Ontario's municipal and school board elections. Remember: in Municipal elections, you are entitled to vote in each municipality where you or your spouse owns property. An owner or tenant of a nonresidential property, or his or her spouse, is not eligible to vote for School Board Trustee

Debunking Some Myths About Your Brain



This is taken from Keep Sharp: Build A Better Brain At Any Age by Sanjay Gupta, MD. Dr. Gupta is an associate professor of neurosurgery at Emery University Hospital and associate chief of neurosurgery at Grady Memorial Hospital in Atlanta, Georgia. He often appears on CNN as a chief medical correspondent and is the author of three NY Times bestselling books. Keep Sharp debunks common myths about aging and mental decline, explores a diet and exercise regimen for the brain, and addresses brain disease, especially Alzheimer's. A section of his book is titled The 12 Most Pervasive Myths and the 5 Pillars That Will Build You. It is the source for this article. Some of the myths are presented here. The book is in the Marmora Public Library.

You Are Dominated By Either A Right or Left Brain

Your brain's two sides are intricately codependent. Psychologists have used the idea to distinguish between different personality types. But brain scanning technology has revealed that the brain's two hemispheres most often work together intricately. For example, language processing, thought to be left brained, is now understood to take place on both sides. The left side handles grammar and pronunciation, while the ride side processes intonation, and the brain recruits both left and right sides for reading and math.

Dementia Is An Inevitable Consequence Of Old Age

Dementia is not a normal part of aging. Typical age-related changes in the brain are not the same as changes caused by disease. The former can be slowed down and the latter can be avoided.

Older People Can't Learn New Things

Learning can happen at any age, especially when you get involved with cognitively stimulating activities like meeting new people or trying new hobbies. The combination of memory being dynamic and the possibility of growing new (brain) neurons means we can continue to change our brain's information, capacity, and learning strengths. Even people diagnosed with cognitive decline, Alzheimer's disease included, can continue to learn new things.

A Crossword Puzzle A Day Can Keep The Brain Doctor Away

Another urban legend is that doing crossword puzzles will keep your brain young. Unfortunately, crossword puzzles only flex a part of your brain, mostly word-finding ability. They won't necessarily keep your brain sharp. That said, there is a value in doing word and number puzzles, including games like Sudoku. What's known is that keeping an active mind can help to reduce decline in thinking skills, and for some, doing crosswords is a way to do that.

Older People Are Doomed To Forget Things

There is a kernel of truth to this; some cognitive skills do decline as you age. You may have been quicker at picking up a new language or memorizing a list of random words when you were young, but you're more likely to be superior with vocabulary and a good judgement of character. You'd score higher on tests of social communication and diplomacy. The other good news is that we tend to improve over time at controlling our emotions, weathering stress and finding meaning in our lives.

Letter to the Newsletter

We received the following from CLWA members representing cottagers living near the sandbar. A LETTER TO BOATERS ON THE SANDBAR

Imagine a caravan of RVs, trucks, cars and motorcycles arrive on your street in front of your house to hold a street party for many hours. Something similar happens on Crowe Lake all summer to the cottagers living on the lake near the sandbar at the mouth of Crowe River. On hot summer days, a fleet of pontoon boats, power boats, and personal watercraft arrive at the sandbar, anchor and essentially have a watery street party.

This is what happens from our perspective on shore:

• Personal watercraft speed along the shore and because they use inboard jet drives instead of propellers, sometimes come very close to our docks where we and our children swim and play. We believe this is a serious safety issue.

• There is always a fair amount of noise motors, music, adults yelling (sometimes coarse language), children playing, dogs barking.

• We are subjected to a variety of smells - gas fumes, smoke of all kinds, food.

• There is sometimes alcohol.

• This drinking results in public urination in the lake (the locals refer to the sandbar as "Piss Beach").

• Some boaters bring their dogs to shore to do their business.

• Some wash their boats or dogs and occasionally themselves in the lake.

• Cottagers sometimes find it difficult to take their own boats out into the open lake because of the crowd on the sandbar.

• Some of the boaters leave their trash behind. Cottage owners pick empty beer cans

out of the water near shore. Some cottagers report garbage floating to shore every day that multiple boats have partied on the sandbar.

We will say that many boaters are courteous and quiet, anchor a reasonable distance from shore, and leave nothing behind when they depart. We have no issue with these folks. Our problem is with the boaters who indulge in the behaviour described above.

But there is a way to address most of our concerns and still allow everyone to enjoy the uniqueness of the sandbar. At the start of the summer boating season, here are some requests for a courteous, environmentally positive, shared use of it.

• Boaters, please keep your distance. This will help ensure that the cottagers enjoy the water as much as you do: safety for everyone, dissipated gas fumes and a lessening of the noise. We want to enjoy the lake as much as you do and we want our kids to be safe in the water.

• Please do not throw your garbage into the water. Take it home.

• Please do not bathe, wash your boats or your pets in the lake. For many of us the lake is our source of water. Your washing could result in the addition of invasive species (from the boats) and phosphorus (from any soaps used) into the water. This washing in the lake stopped years ago because of the environmental impact.

• We should not have to ask you not to drink alcohol on your boat or urinate in the lake. The first is illegal and the latter is a form of pollution as well.

• Please do not bring your dogs to shore to do their business on our lawns. This is trespassing and the ultimate in bad behaviour.

You can always leave them at home.

• Please try to keep the noise down. If we on shore can hear your music, we're sure you can hear it from a few metres away. You shouldn't have to yell over your music.

• Please refrain from using foul language. Your children and ours should not be subjected to it.

We on shore sincerely hope this letter gives all boaters an awareness of what we see from our docks on too many summer days. Most of the boaters on the lake are considerate and safe, but sometimes everybody needs a reminder. There is truly no reason that we cannot all enjoy the natural wonder of the lake and the sandbar together. All we need is a little understanding and courtesy






Walleye Population

What One Cottage Association Is Doing About spent two days spreading tonnes of smooth The Walleye Population Decline river rocks of various sizes in the creek to m

"I've seen the decline with my own eyes," says Margie Manthey, a cottager near Westport, Ont., and the fishing director for the Wolfe Lake Association. She's talking about the walleye population in the lake, one of many in the province to have collapsed because of habitat loss, warming waters due to climate change, and overfishing.

To help the fish stocks recover, the government imposed a walleye slot size restriction (anglers can only keep fish between 40 and 50 cm in length). "We wanted to add on to that," Margie says. So she conferred with Don Goodfellow of the Westport Area Outdoors Association and came up with a plan to rehabilitate Scanlan Creek, which feeds into the lake. The problem? Spring runoff through two culverts in a roadway that crosses the creek was creating too much turbulence in the water for the walleye to reach their natural spawning grounds upstream. The solution? Create a new place downstream for the walleye to spawn.

Jennifer Lamoureux, a biologist with the Rideau Valley Conservation Authority, helped with obtaining grants and government permits; then, late last summer, about two dozen volunteers spent two days spreading tonnes of smooth river rocks of various sizes in the creek to make a suitable environment for walleye egg-laying. Time will tell if the walleyes take to their new spawning grounds. "But we're hopeful they will, now that we've made it sexy for them." (end of Cottage Life article)

What CLWA Has Done About The Walleye Fishing

The CLWA approach to the problem has been on two tracks. First, increase the Walleye population by stocking Walleye fingerlings. Second, try to reduce the Walleye predators by reducing the number of Northern Pike. Stocking: A total of about 100,000 Walley fingerlings were stocked in Crowe Lake from 2011 to 2015. The stocking was the result of combined efforts by the Crowe Lake Waterway Association, especially CLWA members Robert Taylor and Norma Sedgewick, the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) and the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH). Fishing Derbies: Two annual Pike-Only Catch-And-Keep Fishing Derbies have been held in conjunction with Chris' Live Bait. A Winter Ice Fishing Derby and a Summer Fishing Derby have been held as part of the Ontario Family Fishing Week program. CLWA has provided prizes for Adults and for Kids. Fishing Derbies from 2016 through 2020 have taken almost 700 Northern Pike out of the lake.




