

LET'S START WITH THE IMPORTANT STUFF:

Radon is a naturally occurring, colourless and odorless gas that is found at dangerous levels in 5 percent of Ontario homes. It enters the air from the underlying soil. Breathing air with high concentrations of radon can cause lung cancer. Radon is responsible for approximately 13 percent of the lung cancer deaths in Ontario. The Canadian Cancer Society conducted a survey of 1,000 Canadian homes with a finished or partially finished basement and one or more children under 18. The survey revealed how much time children and families spend in basement areas, which are high risk areas for radon exposure.

The survey showed that 40% of the parents surveyed had a child or teen that spent at least 3 hours a day in their basement area and 34% of the parents spent a similar amount of time in their basement area. Almost all had smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors in the basement area, but 90% did not know that radon causes cancer and only 5% tested their homes for the gas. Radon testing kits for do-it-yourself testing cost about \$50. For more information about radon, contact the Canadian Cancer Society or go to www.cancer.ca.

Walleye Fingerlings Stocked in November

The warm November was appreciated for the 2015 stocking of 24,000 walleye fingerlings. The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, with an assist from members of CLWA, completed the third stocking since 2011. These fingerlings join approximately 44,000 stocked in 2011 and 2013.

Bill Neill left his dock in the water later than normal so it could be used as a staging area, then Bill's pontoon boat and Wayne White's pontoon boat were used to do the stocking around the lake. The workforce included three MNR Biologists and two Wildlife Biologists and CLWA members Robert Taylor, Norma Sedgewick-Taylor, Bill Neill, Nancy Neill, Wayne White, Elinor White, Ted McBride, Andrew White, and Morty Morton.

These fingerlings are a little bigger than earlier fingerlings, about 4 inches in length, but they also have a clipped fin on the fish's left side front fin. Pictures of a fingerling with the clipped fin are posted at each boat launch on the lake, Chris' Live Bait and the Marmora Tourism Centre.

The MNR is very anxious to hear from anglers catching walleye with the clipped fin. Net surveys in the summer of 2014 and 2015 and ice hut surveys in the winter of 2014 have not been encouraging. Anglers are being asked to report catching any marked walleye by contacting the Peterborough District of MNR by telephone at 705-755-2001 or email at <u>FISHPT-BO@ONTARIO.CA</u>.

You can also contact CLWA at info@clwa.ca and we will compile the information and send it to MNR. Decisions about future stocking have yet to be made and this information is very important.







High-Tech Cenotaph in Deloro

On October 24, 2015, the first digital interactive cenotaph was dedicated in Deloro. The 11 feet-high obelisk has a QR (Quick Response) code that can be scanned with a smart phone or tablet. The QR code takes the user to an on-line historical film called Lest We Forget. The memorial is in Deloro in front of the Deloro Village Community Centre.

The Deloro War Memorial obelisk is a memorial to the local members of the Canadian Armed Forces. It is also a memorial to the workers of the Deloro Smelting and Refining Company and their contribution to the war effort. The Deloro Mine provided critical material for munitions, airplanes, military equipment, precision instruments and medical equipment for World Wars I and II. The materials were used in the Spitfire and Avro Arrow fighter planes. The mining activity was critical to war effort but it came at a high cost for the health of the miners and the environment.

The film Lest We Forget was produced by James Aubrey Smith and stars local residents and service members from nearby military units. The 20-minute film can be seen at the obelisk or on line at www.deloromemorial.wix.com/ canadawarmemorial.



The Marmora Senior Public School will be expanded and the Earl Prentice Public School will be closed. Starting in the 2017-2018 school year, the Earl Prentice junior Kindergarten through Grade 3 students will join the Grade 4 through Grade 8 students at the expanded Senior Public School. The expansion at the Senior School will result in the addition of five new classrooms and a double-size gym. The current gym will be converted to library and learning commons

The Ministry of Education is providing \$3.2 million towards the \$3.7 million construction and renovation project. The remaining funds will come from school board building renewal funds/reserves. The announcement was made in early November. A community information session will be held in the coming months.
