FairTradeWorks (FTW) has acquired a second piece of property on Crowe Lake and is planning another development project, this one to be called Blairton Terrace. The vacant land is at the west end of the lake in the Belmont Ward of Havelock-Belmont-Methuen (HBM).

They have executed a Predevelopment Agreement with HBM and have started technical studies and consultation meetings with officials in HBM and Peterborough County.

Our Position

The CLWA is not opposed to economic development on the lake provided it is done in a manner that respects the nature of the lake and the rights of the lake residents and users and protects the environment.

In 2014 the CLWA adopted a Waterfront Development Policy Statement. It is posted on our website. It states, in part, "CLWA recognizes benefits of economic development and the right of property owner to develop property, but not to the detriment of the environment, the waterway, or other waterway residents".

This has been our position regarding the proposed development at 621 Cook Road, Crow Hill Estates, and it continues to be our position.

The proposed development is described as a plan of condominiums with a total of 40 units or lots of a minimum of 1 acre each. It includes a condominium road extending from Terrace Road on the east through the property to the end of the Blairton Tent and Trailer Road on the west. The road will be owned and maintained by the condominium corporation. The development also features a communal waterfront area with communal docking and a picnic pavilion.

Planning approvals from the Municipality of HBM and the County of Peterborough will be required and include approval of the Draft Plan, amendment to the HBM Official Plan, and amendment to the HBM Comprehensive Zoning By-law. The shoreline and natural features such as wetlands will be designated as "Environmental Protection".

The amendment to the zoning by-law will designate the residential units as "Seasonal Residential" to recognize seasonal occupancy. The full application submission is anticipated by October 20. The studies and application material will be posted on the HBM website.

CLWA representatives are meeting with officials in HBM, Peterborough, Marmora and Lake, and the Crowe Valley Conservation Authority. We are also talking with property owners in the neighborhood and experts in waterfront development and zoning. We will be reviewing the materials submitted and are enlisting the assistance of volunteers with technical expertise in these areas.

We are asking for the assistance of any CLWA member with information or expertise that can help us to formulate an appropriate response to this proposed development. People with backgrounds in hydrology and environmental science would be very helpful.




Words from the President

Thanks for giving your time and effort for a great Canada Day celebration.



The Forsyth Street landmark and former home and office of Dr. Herb Parkin was opened in mid-September at a gala launch party attended by federal and provincial politicians, local business leaders, professional partners and the media.

It was officially opened by the guest of honour, Mary Jane Goodchild, the daughter of Dr. Parkin.

The structure has been divided into eight offices to act as a one-stop professional centre for legal, real estate and lending practices. "The heritage structure did not require a lot of retrofits and we should note that the building stands as strong today as it did in the 1800s," said FairTradeWorks founder and president Jim Perkins.

Occupancy will be complete by October. The meeting was an opportunity for members to hear reports on the year's activities and to elect Officers and Directors for 2017-2018.

It has been the practice in past years to invite representatives from the Councils in Marmora and Lake and Havelock-Belmont-Methuen to speak to the group. This year Mayor Terry Clemens and Mayor Ron Gerow reviewed activity in the municipalities that have particular impact on the waterway and the association members. Reports from the CLWA Committees made up the last half of the meeting. After the reports, Past President Norma Crofts conducted the election of Officers and Directors. The 2016-17 team was re-elected.

The meeting closed before noon, as promised by the Agenda, and ended with the singing of O Canada and the cutting of a Canada 150 cake. The refreshments and support provided by the Curling Club were outstanding. Thanks to Jason Coveney, Myrtle Barry and Donna Gabourie for their help.




Treasurer Report: Elinor White

This past year, our revenues were down over 2015/16 by \$3200 due mainly because of lost members or late renewals. Your board responded accordingly keeping our annual expenses down by \$7000 over the previous year. Bill Neill did a fantastic job, as usual, on our July 1st celebration and he did it by spending 33% less than the previous year. We saved money on our newsletter publications and hence our postage and we trimmed our event expenditures. There is no free lunch on this board and members supply their own coffee and cookies at meetings.

New members and renewing members showed us that they like what we do by generously supporting our programs. We thank you. Two Canada Day Celebration events – the kayak/canoe trail and the Concert on the Lake did not take place for lack of volunteers and not because of funding. Bayview Trailer Park, Booster Park and the Federal Government are very strong supporters of our Association thorough their Canada Day Celebration donations. Our scavenger hunt at both Booster and Bayview Parks was attended by 150 children and their families. We will continue to do our water testing, rocks and shoals and support the ongoing health of our lake and waterways.

At close of this year, we have approximately 80% of our previous year's operating expenses in our account. We hold our two GIC's in reserve. Next month, we will be setting our goals and expenditures with this figure in mind. Our members and our volunteers are the life blood of our organization. We can't operate without you.

Water Quality Report: Sandy Fraser

There is very little change in the lake quality. Testing was done this spring with the following results:

- Phosphorous: 6.8 and 7.4 micro grams/litre meaning algae will not happen,
- Water clarity is 4.6 to 4.8 which is good and the same since 2000,
- Calcium is moderate to high at 23.3 mg/litre. Fish need 1 mg to live so the lake is healthy.



Lighted Boat Parade: Bill Neill

Due to the parade leader (me) being absent from the scene, the Lighted boat parade got off to a late and disorganized start. In my own defence the fireworks barges were delayed in launching as a result of the rain and frankly the barges took priority. Fortunately Wayne White and crew stepped in and took over as leader and the parade carried on. We eventually caught up and remained as tail gunner.

There were about 40 to 50 boats in the parade and the groups on shore were numerous by all appearances enjoying the parade prior to the firework display. Considering the weather, we felt there was a good turn-out for the parade.

Due to the growth of the fireworks and the added responsibilities that go with it this parade will be my last as parade leader.

Fireworks Display: Bill Neill

During the post-event review of 2016 fireworks it was concluded that we had out-grown the current barge both in weight and space limitations. This is a barge that Bonter Marine has generously loaned to us each year, allowing our team to modify and alter it at will. We owe them a debt of thanks. We entered into an agreement with Bonter Marine that we would repair a damaged barge on-site in exchange for access it for the Fireworks, giving us a second barge.

As it is Canada's 150, we attempted to provide an even bigger and better show. In doing so we searched out a number of new suppliers from Spain, Mexico, and Portugal as well as the usual China supplier. In doing so we were able to provide a greater variety.

The two barges were towed out into the lake and put in place by the detonation team of Randy Vilneff and son Brynn, Andrew White and Jim Rose. They gave us the best show ever.

Photo Contest: Ritch Smith

We had 17 entries – a decrease in number of entries from 2015 and 2016. We added a fourth category for 2017 to recognize Canada 150. Deadline date is November 1, 2017.

The photo contest is an important source of photos for our newsletters, membership brochure and our website. However, the declining participation is cause for concern.

Fishing Report: Paul Morton

The Summer Fishing Derby was again run by Chris' Live Bait with prizes and financial assistance from CLWA. It had 105 entries this year and about half the entries were children. A total of 145 pike were taken out of the lake. The biggest was 7.5 pounds.

The Winter Ice Fishing Pike Only Fishing Derby was a great success. The event was cancelled in 2016 because of the danger of thin ice but there was no fear of that this year. February 18 2017 was a beautiful day for fishing on a frozen Crowe Lake. There were 140 adults and 30 kids in the Derby and they caught 45 pike with a combined weight of 106 lbs 3 oz. The average pike weighed in at 2 lbs 4 oz. The heaviest pike was 5 lbs 8 oz, and the smallest weighed 15 ounces.

In the fall of 2016, CLWA assisted the MNR in putting 25,000 Walleye fingerlings in the lake. This brings total stocking to almost 100,000 since starting in 2011. The MNR still needs to hear about any pike caught with clipped fins on fish caught. They like a picture of the fish if possible.



Rocks and Shoals Report: Vesa Koivusalo

The following report outlines the activities relating to placement of markers warning boaters on Crowe River and Crowe Lake of known underwater rocks and shoals in 2016-17:

- Task is performed by Rob Harding and Ken Parton.
- Markers are scheduled to be placed by the May long weekend and removed after the Thanksgiving weekend. This year due to high water levels, 42 markers were placed on May 24/25
- Four or five markers are lost each year, so Rob decided to use 3/16 inch rope instead of 1/8 inch. By the end of June no markers had been lost.
- It's always good to have more inventory on hand so any donations of brake rotors (preferably not from large pickup trucks) and 4 -litre bleach bottles would be appreciated.
- If anyone knows of spots where markers should be placed, please let a Board member know and Rob will be notified and will accompany you to the suggested location.
- Unfortunately, Ken Parton is moving out of the area, so thank you to Ken for his years of helping place the markers. Rob is currently looking for a replacement.







The Leaky Raft by James Dalton - Growing Up in Deloro



Jim Dalton was born in Ottawa in 1936 and at age three his family moved to Deloro. *The Leaky Raft: A Village Raises A Child* is the true story of Jim and his brother David and their childhood in Deloro.

Jim returned to Marmora in early September for a book signing program sponsored by the Marmora Historical Foundation. The program included a reading by Jim of one of the chapters. Jim shared his memories of Deloro and the people he and his brother knew and grew up with. There were 5 or 6 people in the audience of about 40 who are part of the story and are mentioned in the book. Jim donated several copies of the book to the Marmora Library.
