Municipal Election Set for October 27

When is the election?

October 27th, 2014, to elect the one Reeve, one Deputy Reeve, and three Councilors to a 4-year term.

Who can vote?

Canadian citizens, 18 years and older, resident of the municipality <u>or owner</u> <u>or tenant of property in the municipality</u> (seasonal owners) and spouse of owner/ <u>tenant.</u>

Where can you vote?

You can vote in each municipality where you own property; you can vote by mail in the Marmora Municipal election; in-person voting on Election Day will be at the Municipal building.

Only vote once per municipality

If a resident has properties in 2 wards of a municipality, they can only vote in one ward.

Who determines residency?

You do, as per Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) records.

Crowe Lake Matters

Voting:

The alternative Voting Method "Vote by Mail" is being used for the 2014 Municipal Election in Marmora and Lake.

Voting kits will be mailed by Canada Post, to electors whose name appears on the preliminary list of electors during the week of September 15th, 2014. You will be issued one voting kit. Should you receive more than one kit, please note that it is against the law to vote more than once in a municipality (Municipal Election Act 97, s 51 (2)).

To ensure that your completed ballot (the signed declaration form and the secrecy envelope containing the ballot, placed in the yellow return envelope) is received by the Municipality prior to the voting deadline, it must be deposited with Canada Post by October 17th 2014.

The yellow return envelope may also be dropped off at the Marmora and Lake Municipal Office until October 24, 2014 during normal office hours.

Highway 7 Crowe River Bridge:

(The work on bridge rehabilitation)

Traffic on the bridge will be restricted to one lane in the spring and fall of 2014 and spring of 2015 but two lanes during July and August of 2014.

Temporary traffic signals have been installed at the bridge and the Cameron Street entrance to Highway 7 has been closed.

The detour route for Cameron Street is by Linn Street or Nash Street. Construction is scheduled to be complete in June 2015.

2014 Municipal Budget:

The Marmora and Lake Municipal Council approved the 2014 Municipal budget in April with a tax levy increase of 1.75% and a tax rate decrease of 1.5%.

The total budget is \$8.787 million with an operating budget of \$5.637 million and capital budget of \$3.150 million. The budget includes work on the Deloro septic system; replacement of the McFaul Bridge on Beaver Creek; improvements at the Visitor Centre, Medical Centre, and Arena.

Website for Voting Enumeration: VoterlooKup.ca

You can go to voterlookup.ca to review your voter status using a site owned and managed by the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC). MPAC is responsible for identifying all potential municipal, school board and District Social Services Administration Board electors. MPAC provides this information to election clerks in support of local election events.

[Note: Marmora will use a Vote By Mail program and ballots will be sent out during the week of September 15, so you should make sure you are on the voter list before that date in order to receive your voting package.]

Voterlookup.ca lets you:

- confirm the accuracy of your elector information;
- update your information where incorrectly recorded;
- add a name to the enumeration so that it is correctly recorded for municipal and school board voting purposes.
- voterlookup.ca cannot process requests concerning persons who are under 18 years of age on Election Day (October 27 2014).

MPAC uses this information to prepare Preliminary Lists of Electors for municipal, school board and DSSAB elections, for municipal and school board planning purposes, property assessment purposes, and preparation of jury lists and population reports.

Observation Platform in Nayler's Common Wetland Dedicated

On June 7th, a ribbon-cutting and dedication ceremony officially opened an important enhancement to a special area in Marmora, an observation platform overlooking the marsh in the Nayler's Common. The platform provides a great view of the wide variety of plants and animals in the wetland and it is easily accessed from the Red Trail. The Commons can be entered from Highway #7 and Drummond Park. Both of these locations provide information brochures and show maps of the trails and the location of the observation platform.

Wetlands are distinct ecosystems with vegetation that is adapted to its unique soil conditions. Flooded or wet for all or part of the year, the water in a wetland can be freshwater or saltwater or a brackish combination.

Nayler's is a freshwater wetland. Wetlands have a number of roles in the environment, principally water purification, flood control, and shoreline stability. They are the most biologically diverse of all ecosystems and provide a home to a wide variety of plant and animal life. They are recognized around the world as special and diverse areas and their protection has been strengthened in recent years by changes in Provincial policies and regulation and by programs to increase public awareness. The Nayler's Common is a 20 hectare area of forest and wetland acquired by the Township in the early 1990s to provide a safe recreational area in an ecologically diverse area, to develop the property in an environmentally sound fashion for education and recreation, and to enhance the knowledge of the human population about the plant and animal population around them. It was part of a commercial brick making operation owned by John W Nayler in the 1880s and 90s. The clay in the area was baked in kilns on the property and became about 75,000 bricks for many of the homes and businesses in Marmora. The clay in the area ran out and the brickyard was abandoned about 1911.

Today three trails and the observation platform provide the chance to see streams, marsh and swamp areas, beaver ponds, and a wide variety of wild flowers, trees, shrubs, and birds. A boardwalk system is in the planning stages but resources (money, material, labour) are needed.

The initiative of the Marmora and Lake Environmental Advisory Committee, the leadership and expertise of Curtis Trimble, Manager of Parks and Recreation, and the financial support of the Toronto Dominion Bank's Friends of the Environment Foundation, were critical to making this happen. Contractors Corey Burgess and Brad Dorie gave their time and skill to the construction and the Stewardship Youth Rangers, of the Peterborough Youth Program funded by MNR, provided the greatly appreciated manual labour.

The Top 10 Ways to Help Control Invasive Species

10. Check your pets. Invasive seeds can be carried in the fur and mud on pets.

9. Buy firewood locally. Invasive insects like the Emerald Ash Borer and the Asian Longhorned Beetle can be carried on firewood.

8. Clean bikes before moving to new locations. Mud on bikes can carry seeds of invasive plants like Garlic Mustard and Dog-strangling Vine.

7. Clean ATVs before transport. Mud on ATVs and trail equipment can harbor invasive plant seeds.

6. Look for and use non-invasive plants in your garden. Some ornamental plants can be invasive. Soil can carry seeds, exotic earthworms, or European Fire Ants.

5. Boots. Clean the mud off, check for seeds and insects.

4. Inspect patio furniture. Lawn chairs can harbor invasive insects such as European Earwigs or seeds of invasive plants.

A closer look: Ticks resemble flattened, miniature crabs. You are most likely to find one when it is attached to your body or clothing (or dog). Adults have eight legs; they're arachnids, not insects.

Action time: Ticks may hitchhike at any time—day or night. The time of year varies by species; American dog tick adults are more plentiful from spring to early summer, and adult blacklegged, or deer, ticks (the ones that transmit Lyme disease) peak in the fall.

Avoid the bite: Stick to trails and more open areas and tuck in clothing. Strong, DEET-based repellent can be sprayed on pants, socks, and shoes. Check your clothing and body daily. Remove ticks by seizing the head as close to your skin as possible with blunt tweezers and pulling. Removed early, there is little chance that ticks will transmit disease, but you should wash and disinfect the area of the bite. If the tick is removed after more than 24 hours, save it and note the date and location, says Robbin Lindsay of the Public Health Agency of Canada; if you develop symptoms in the next one to two weeks (look for a rash—bull's eye or otherwise), see your doctor, taking the tick for identification.

Systemic symptoms: including multiple rashes, a lowgrade fever, neck stiffness, fatigue, and severe headaches can appear two to six weeks after a bite from an infected tick, even if no rash developed earlier on.

Amazing fact: After a full blood meal, a tick may be 30 to 60 times its starting size.

Buoys on the Lake Update - "Helping To Keep Boating Safer On The Crowe"

After a hard winter, followed by a flood in the spring, it's time to enjoy another boating season.

Rob Harding is back this year to place and maintain the rocks and shoals buoys on the Crowe. Rob was busy in the spring getting the buoys cleaned up and ready to go. Despite the effects of the flood, he was able to place all the markers for the long weekend in May, a job well done. During the boating season, Rob will be checking the markers and replacing them as required, right up until the Thanksgiving Weekend, the end of the season.

This year we will be slowly introducing a new look to the CLWA markers. Currently, our markers are white with a 2 inch wide red reflective stripe. Unfortunately, the red reflective tape is no longer available. However, through much research we were able to find a product that is more reflective in a low light condition, yet withstand the exposure of a wet environment.

The material is 3M Scotchlite Reflective Material – SOLAS (Safety of Life at Sea). This product is intended for reflectorizing SOLAS life support equipment such as life vests, jackets, and rafts. It is used to enhance visibility of life-saving equipment in nighttime, or low-light conditions.

The 2 inch wide tape is silver in colour under daytime viewing conditions and reflect a bright white when illuminated by a light source. It's this reflective quality that makes this product quite intriguing. So as the "old" markers are in need of replacing, these "new" markers will be taking their place.

On another note, Rocks and Shoals needs your help. We use old brake rotors as weights to hold the markers in place. On occasion we lose one or two over the season.

Should your vehicle require a "brake job" and new rotors are part of the fix, please ask your mechanic for your used rotors, we can use them. Just let us know where we can pick them up.

As in the past, if you see one of our buoys, with the CLWA Logo washed up on shore or floating down the Crowe, please retrieve it and let one us know, so we can put it back in service.

Having said that, The CLWA wishes everyone a Safe and Fun Boating Season!
