If a health situation arises, here are a few tips from Campbellford Memorial Hospital:

- 1. If you're alone and your condition is urgent or life-threatening, Call 911 right away.
- 2. If you're experiencing shortness of breath, chest pain, tingling in a limb, slurred speech, drooping facial features, a sudden change in vision, a sustained fever or severe abdominal pain, get to the ER right away.
- 3. Be aware that symptoms you consider minor can signal major trouble. Broken limbs and cuts also merit a visit as well as children with symptoms of dehydration (frequent vomiting or diarrhea, a decrease in body fluids).

If you do find yourself in your local Emergency Department, here are a few things that you can do to help minimize your time there:

- 1. To avoid spreading or catching anything, wash your hands frequently and use the disinfectant dispensers to clean your hands upon arrival.
- 2. Wear a mask if you think you might spread your condition by coughing, or if your immune system is weak.
- 3. Make sure you have your health card, your family doctor's info, and a list of your allergies and major surgeries. If available, bring your child's immunization records.
- 4. Also bring a list of prescription and non-prescription medications, especially if you're a caregiver accompanying an elderly person seeking medical help. If you do not have time to make a list, then please bring the bottles.
- 5. Bring a friend or family member to keep you company, listen to what the doctor says, and ensure you understand and remember information exchanged during your visit.
- 6. Do not snack while you're waiting. If you eat or drink something while you're waiting and later learn you need emergency surgery, then your full stomach may delay surgery.
- 7. Make sure you know what to do when you go home from the hospital. If you're discharged, don't leave until you understand exactly what you have been told and what you are supposed to do. Clarify any danger signs you should watch for and whom to contact for a follow-up.

Good to know

There is a flat fee parking lot, east of the main entrance. In order to get your car out, you will need to have two toonies and one loonie - the only combination accepted by the machine.

Unnamed but not unappreciated. We'll celebrate the Anniversary at our AGM on July 18 at the Curling Club. We'll recognize as many of our past leaders as we can identify. We're even starting down the river below the dam. We're going to continue our recruitment efforts. More members give us financial and program stability. I hope you enjoy this edition. Let me know what you think of the Newsletter, the CLWA programs, the issues you're concerned about, the AGM, or whatever is on your mind.

Closure

The staff will be reassigned to TD branches in Havelock or Madoc.

On Saturday, March 7th, my wife Sandy and I attended the Annual General Meeting of the Federation of Cottage Association (FOCA) as representatives from the Crowe Lake Waterway Association. While there, it occurred to me that perhaps it was time to remind the members of CLWA that one of the benefits of CLWA membership is that we are all also members of FOCA and precisely what FOCA does for us.

FOCA is a not-for-profit organization representing volunteer lake associations and waterfront property owners in Ontario. Their mission is "To protect thriving and sustainable waterfronts across Ontario".

Here is a list of some of the things which FOCA does for us:

FOCA provides a province-wide voice for Ontario cottagers and waterfront property owners on issues which affect us all. FOCA does this by acquiring a seat on many government and environmental committees. These include advising against hydro rate increases, pursuing the issue of a new funding formula for the Ontario Provincial Police and working to protect waterfront communities from uncontrolled land development.

FOCA has initiated programs and resources such as the Aquatic Invasive Species Monitoring Program, the Cottage Succession Seminar Series and the Lake Partner Program in which volunteers measure phosphorus levels and water clarity in Ontario lakes.

FOCA keeps its members apprised of what is happening with their committee work and programs by sending Elerts and Newsletters to them via the Internet.

FOCA also offers discounts from their sponsors, including Cade Insurance, Superior Propane, Xplornet, Cottage Life Magazine and the Canadian Canoe Museum in Peterborough to name a few. Taking advantage of these discounts can save you more than the cost of your CLWA dues.

Coinciding with the Ministry of Natural Resources Family Free Fishing Weekend, the Crowe Lake Pike Catch 'n' Keep Derby was held at Marmora Booster Park, on Saturday, February 14.

The derby was organized by Sandra Vanattan of Chris' Live Bait of Marmora, with support by the Crowe Lake Waterway Association. In addition to introducing children and adults to the fun of fishing, both winter and summer, this type of event helps to sustain Crowe Lake walleye populations and support the walleye stocking initiative by reducing the pike. All 15 pike that were weighed in, were taken home by the anglers to be eaten. No fish are wasted.

Despite an extremely cold Valentine's Day for the derby, a total of 121 participants entered, with 26 youngsters in the 12 and under category. Adults were charged a \$10 fee, and 12 and under were free; all fees collected were returned to the participants in prizes.

In the 12 and Under Category, first place was for Nyomi Bertrand's three-pound 14-ounce pike, winning a rod and reel combo, tackle box and \$50 gift certificate.

In second place was Blake Hewitt with the threepound 13-ounce pike he caught, awarding him with an Ugly Stik Combo and \$40 gift certificate.

All participants 12 and under received a grab bag with lures and fishing information.

In the adult category, Dave Christopoulos was awarded an eight-inch Eskimo Power Auger with his six-pound three-ounce pike. John Huggins, in second place, was the winner of \$150 cash for his five-pound nine-ounce pike. Dustin Clarke landed the third heaviest pike which won him a \$100 gift certificate donated by CLWA for his four-pound one-ounce fish.

Three \$50 gift certificates were awarded to Kim Brownson, Wyatt Brownson and Alex Christopoulos for the hidden weight category.

Hats, tackle bags, fillet knives and lure packs were handed out at the final weigh-in as well as draw prizes.

Sandra Vanattan of Chris' Live Bait sends out a great big thank-you to the sponsors: Bonter Marine, Crowe Lake Waterway Association, Canada Pro, KTL Canada and Northumberland Insulation for their generosity in helping to put on this successful family fishing event.

Ontario Family Fishing Events is a province-wide opportunity for Canadian residents to fish in Ontario waters without needing the outdoors fishing card. The February 14 to 16 event was the first of two annual sessions of license-free fishing. The next event all over Ontario is for the week of July 4 to 12, 2015 (12:01 a.m. Saturday to 11:59 p.m. Sunday).

Partners in the Ontario Family Fishing Events include the participation of Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, Canadian Sportfishing Industry Association, Canadian National Sportfishing Foundation, Fishing and Oceans Canada, Lucky Strike, Shimano, and Ontario Out of Doors.





Vegetation Management at Hydro One

I'm going to assume that most of us have, at one time, been frustrated by By: Vesa Koivusalo hydro outages and the long wait times

we sometimes endured before power was restored. At the 2015 FOCA Annual General Meeting I heard a presentation which, for me at least, serves to explain why some of these outages occur and why it sometimes takes a long time to restore hydro power - especially in rural areas of Ontario.

The presentation was by Dave Price, a Zone Superintendent with Hydro One Forestry Services.

Forestry Services has many challenges as they try to maintain hydro service to its customers by ensuring that vegetation does not interfere with existing and planned power lines and other equipment. They must balance safety, customer interests, cost efficiency and environmental responsibility. Their job is especially difficult when you consider that Hydro One must support 29,000 km of high-voltage grid lines and more than 122,000 km of low-voltage power lines.

Forestry Services are required to maintain a reliable supply of electricity through these lines by minimizing tree-related power outages. To do this, Hydro One Forestry Services:

- removes 200,000 tress per year (on average)
- replaces removed trees with seedlings or small trees
- trims 300,000 trees per year
- contacts over 27,000 customers per year
- maintains a staff of 510 regular and 820 seasonal employees (490 of their employees are arborists)
- maintains a standing of best in class for safety, customer service, tree removal techniques, and training tools and techniques.

Forestry Services does a good job; however, they could still use our help. Home-owners and cottagers also have a role to play. Here's what we can do:

- remember to use a certified contractor for connects and disconnects from the grid and to install backup generators
- ask Hydro One to take down trees beside the main hydro lines
- remember to manage vegetation around customer-owned lines
- report any dangerous trees near power lines

Hydro One Forestry Services exists to try and sure that our all-important power supply is disrupted as infrequently as possible by Nature and restored quickly when the inevitable problems occur. All things considered, I believe they do a pretty fine job.

Recycling Change to Save Money



Here is a good way to save yourself and the municipality money, TWICE.

Take back all your glass wine, liquor and beer bottles instead of putting them in the blue box. You get your deposit money back, plus you can save money on your taxes by helping the municipality cut recycling costs. It costs more money to recycle glass than the recycler can make selling the recycled glass. It is estimated it cost Quinte Waste Solutions over \$94,000 last year to recycle wine, liquor and beer bottles. This is your recycler and we all paid for those bottles again after paying our deposit.

So PLEASE take your bottles back for the deposit instead of putting them in the Blue Box.

Dear Friends of the Crowe Valley Conservation Foundation

Have you ever wondered where the funding comes from to maintain our local conservation areas? It's easy - through donations and support from organizations and people such as you. Our campaign to purchase building materials to complete the restoration of the stairs, railings and new washroom facility at the Gut Conservation area is in full swing.

Our goal for this campaign is to raise \$7,500. At present we have raised \$4,625 but we are still in need \$2,875 as we enter our most crucial stage. We need your help in creating a compelling outdoor recreational opportunity for members of our community.

Features of the area include:

Bug Off Some Simple Ideas



Nothing ruins a summer meal quicker than a bug or pest infestation. Follow these tips to prevent unwanted pests from sticking around this summer.

- Seal your doors. Visit your local hardware store and invest in an aluminum slat or door sweep. These will block openings under your doors. You can also use weather-stripping to seal off openings.
- Keep your doors shut. It seems obvious, but it's tempting to leave patio doors and windows open when there is a cool summer breeze. Make sure your kids aren't going in and out of the house too often, and remind them to close the door behind them.
- Add screens. These will prevent many a bug from entering your home, and will allow air circulate through your house.
- Maintain your yard. This is easy to overlook, but if you have puddles and other crevices that attract water outside of your back door, you'll be asking for trouble. Mosquitoes seek out pools of water and will linger if you don't keep your property dry. Help avoid this by keeping gutters free of leaves and debris so water doesn't build up. Fill in ditches that can collect water with soil or a planter.
- Seal cracks around the house. These include tough-to-reach-spots like chimneys and rooftop openings. Mice are particularly clever when it comes to sneaking through small openings so assess your roof and all levels of your home.
- Store your trash properly. Don't leave food lying around. Restrict food waste to the kitchen; put pet food away, and keep compost bins securely closed. Wipe down your counters often and use detergents to rid your kitchen of food splatter that might go unnoticed.



911 Calls Impact Cost of Policing and Taxes

Under the new funding formula for setting OPP policing costs for municipalities, Marmora and Lake is facing an increase of \$81,500 for this coming year, escalating to a total increase of \$236,300 at the end of 3 years. Part of the funding formula is based on the amount of police activity in Marmora and Lake including responses to 911 calls.

The OPP have to respond to all 911 calls with 2 officers. Last year, OPP responded to 472 "911 hang-up" calls.

This problem wasted 381 hours of their time. Many of these calls were unintentional; kids playing with phones (even an old unsubscribed cell phone can still dial 911), errors in dialing, pocket dialing or just pranks.

The OPP have to respond as they have no idea whether you are being mugged or worse and the criminal has just taken your phone away from you. So please help cut down on unintentional 911 calls.

Be careful when dialing, disconnect auto 911 dial on your cellphone, and do not allow kids to play with old cell phones.


2015 CLWA Signs Feature 75th Anniversary
