Ontario Family Fishing Events is a province-wide opportunity for Canadian residents to fish Ontario waters without the otherwise mandatory fishing version outdoors card. The Ontario Government has designated four periods throughout the year as license-free:

February 15 – 17, 2020 (12:01 a.m. Saturday to 11:59 p.m. Monday) May 9 – 10, 2020 (12:01 a.m. Saturday to 11:59 p.m. Sunday) June 20 – 21, 2020 (12:01 a.m. Saturday to 11:59 p.m. Sunday) July 4 – 12, 2020 (12:01 a.m. Saturday to 11:59 p.m. Sunday).

During all other time periods, Canadian residents between the ages of 18 and 64 years must purchase a valid fishing license to legally fish in Ontario.

Participants fishing without a license must fish under the Conservation fishing license limits which are set out in the current Ontario Recreational Fishing Regulations Summary. With the exception of the licensing requirement, Ontario fishing regulations, fees and limits continue to apply during license-free days.

### CLWA Letter To M&L Council About BOGs

(The following letter was delivered to the Marmora & Lake Council on October 15, 2019 by a delegation from CLWA)

Council of the Municipality of Marmora and Lake

Subject: Floating Mats of Bulrushes

Imagine discovering a mass of bulrushes on your waterfront. In 2017, one was 250 feet long and in 2018 another was 600 feet. And both were on the same CLWA member's property. This is happening around the lake and the river. These mats of bulrushes are causing anger, frustration, and growing concern. We have kept track of these events by collecting data and pictures and stories to find some underlying sources, the reasons why this is happening, and possible course of actions.

The season of 2019 repeated the unwelcome arrival of the large masses of bulrush mats on the waterfront and beaches of the Crowe. The numbers this year are greater than 2018 and 2017. This is what climate change looks like. High water levels, strong winds, and fast changing temperatures are creating conditions for the mats to break away from the wetland areas naturally. The winds and currents carry the mats into the lake and then onto somebody's shoreline.

Residents, your constituents, are not happy. They can push the mats off their property, knowing it may arrive on their neighbor's shore. Or they can invest significant amounts of time and money to remove the debris. But they know it may happen again and again. Some people are spending every weekend dealing with the problem and the aggravation. We have heard of cottagers who are thinking about selling. We have heard some people are considering appealing their property assessments to get a reduction in their taxes because of the reduced property value as a consequence of the recurring problem and associated loss of access to the waterfront.

Our investigations have found no organization at any government level that will assume responsibility for the problem or even offer help. The CLWA will continue to investigate and document the problem as we look at our options and seek solutions. At some point in the future, we may come to you with a request for assistance. Our objective today is to alert you to the gravity of the problem.

The Committee was formed to collect information about the impact of the BOGs, to see if there are remedies or ways to manage them, and to educate people about them. 
### Help Found, Help Needed







# OHIP Out of Country Services (from OHIP publication)

<u>New in 2020</u> – Dialysis Services: Starting January 1, 2020, this new program will be operated by the Ontario Renal Network with funding from the Ontario government. Patients will receive the same reimbursement rates as currently provided through existing programs. The launch of the new program to fund out-of-country dialysis services will coincide with the wind down of the limited Out-of-Country Travelers Program.

Out of Country Emergency Health Services: Emergency health services are those given in connection with an acute (defined as: Treatment for a short period of time in which a patient is treated for a brief but severe episode of an illness, disease, condition or injury), unexpected condition, illness, disease or injury that arises outside Canada and requires immediate treatment. The Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) only covers emergency health services at very limited rates. If you plan to travel outside of Ontario, it is strongly recommended that you obtain additional private medical insurance and fully understand what your policy covers. For information about travelling outside Canada, please refer to the ministry's Fact Sheets "Travelling Outside Canada" and "Ambulance Services Billing". 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### Changes in Water Levels (The BOGs Committee)

We asked Tim Pidduck at the Crowe Valley Conservation Authority to tell us the key dates in the water level management of Crowe Lake. These are dates and target water levels you should know about. The water levels are expressed in meters above sea-level (mas) measured at the Marmora Dam. For those who have problems with the metric system, a change of .1 meters equal a change of 3.9 inches

Fall Draw Down - start October 15. Water level on October 25, 2019 was 182.41 mas

Winter water level target is 182.25 mas

Summer water level target is 182.42 mas. Target to reach this level is the May long-weekend with the objective of staying at or around it all summer.

Tim also provided the following:

The CVCA draws down water levels in the lakes that have water control structures (dams) throughout the fall season. This is done to increase the flood storage capacity in dam controlled lakes. It gives us as water managers some flexibility to absorb the spring runoff, which helps to mitigate the effects flooding. Crowe Lake is one of the largest lakes that we have an opportunity to implement this strate-gy. It is also the last lake in the system that has a dam. Once the water flows through the Marmora dam, we have no further control on the Crowe River.

The fall draw down on Crowe Lake every year is October 15th. While that is the target date, there are factors that influence the rate creating the flood storage capacity. Dry summer weather and the lake at or slightly below the summer water level without fall rains means the draw down will likely be fairly "orderly", with few fluctuations to get to the winter water level. Or, like this year, the watershed had a dry summer followed by an extremely wet October that pushed levels higher and made it very difficult to initiate a draw down that would be effective and follow an average decrease in water levels. It has been an extended draw down period with the significant fluctuation. Fortunately, a colder than normal early November has allowed us to play a bit of catch up and we are in a good place at the moment (November 22, 2019).

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### Insect Apocalypse?

Some scientists have been warning that there is an "insect apocalypse" underway. A global analysis of 452 species in 2014 estimated that insect abundance had declined 45 percent over 40 years. In the U.S., the numbers of iconic Monarch butterflies has fallen 80 to 90 percent in the last 20 years. Systematic measurements of butterfly populations are the best indicator of how the world's 5.5 million insect species are doing, the authors of the Ohio study noted.

Bees, butterflies, and other insects pollinate one-third of all food crops.

### The Trash Is Piling Up

Since China effectively stopped importing foreign plastic and paper trash last year, the effect has been felt in global recycling and scrap markets. Scrap prices "collapsed"; Southeast Asian countries were "quickly swamped with mountains of plastic they didn't have the capacity to deal with"; and countries like the US, UK, and Australia are finding it harder to offshore their trash problems.

As a result, local recycling policies are changing (some kinds of plastic are no longer being collected in cities, for instance), and ambitious plans to reduce net waste are proving difficult.
